MIRZA ASADULLAH KHAN GALIB:

Mirza Asadullah Baig Khan (Urdu: 27 مرزا اسد الله بيگ خان; December 1797 – 15 February 1869), also known by the pen names of Ghalib (Urdu: غالب, romanized: Ġālib, lit. 'dominant') and Asad (Urdu: عالب, romanized: Asad, lit. 'lion'), was an Indian poet. His honorific was Dabir-ul-Mulk, Najm-ud-Daula. During his lifetime, the already declining Mughal Empire was eclipsed and displaced by the British East India Company Rule and finally deposed following the defeat of the First Indian War of Independence (Sepoy Mutiny) of 1857; these are described through his work.

He wrote in both Urdu and Persian. Although his Persian Divan is at least five times longer than his Urdu Divid. His fame rests on his poetry in Urdu. Today, Ghalibramams popular not only in the Indian subcontinent but also almong the Hindustani diaspora around the world.
