- 1. Have a catchy title (puns, metaphors, irony).
- 2. Grip the audience with a brief introduction.

- 6. Organise your thoughts in some sort of sequence or order signpost.

- 8. First person pronouns.
- 9. Provide evidence statistics to back up your statement.
- 10. Alliteration for emphasis.
- 11. Introduce opposing opinions give people the opportunity to disagree.
- 12. Measured, subtle sarcastic tone.
- 13. End with food for thought (a rhetorical question, repetition of an initial idea).
