

'Mixed equally' is a reference to the alchemy of indestructible love. Life depended on an equal mixture in the human body of the 'humours', which determined personality. This was proposed by Galen (129-216), a Greek physician.

Philosophy theories existed until 1628. However, this could also be a reference to medieval Thomist philosophy on ideas about the difference between earthly bodies and heavenly bodies. Aquinas argued that, using the ideas of Galen, that earthly bodies were elemental whereas heavenly bodies were not elemental and are therefore eternal. There could also be the notion of death as an orgasm here, 'le petit mort'.
