

Ray characters

- Witches + Wiers to Macbeth (dozens after murders)
- Macbeth + King Duncan
- Macbeth + L. Macbeth
- CONTRAST TO Macbeth
- CONTRAST TO others in castle

Act 5, Scene 11

- after dreaming M, Macbeth pledges to "plant" a new order and to heal wounds M and "friend-like queen" inflicted
- nature metaphor -> return to political order by nature

Act 5, Scene 1

- Lady M having terrible dreams / sleepwalking
- giving conscience rebelling against unnatural vend she was turned into

Act 4, Scene 3

- huge contrast to M (doesn't heal Scotland)

Act 4, Scene 3

- Macbeth speaks w/ English doctor = King Edward of Eng is so serious that he can cure disease.

witches' appearance as present -
 omen of magical power

Act 3, Scene 5

- Banquo's ghost = M unable to feel natural from unnatural anymore

Act 3, Scene 5 (witches' clear intentions)

- would sisters meet w/ Hecate, goddess of witches - goss with her help, M will be shown visions that give him confidence and "draw him to confusion"

Act 4, Scene 1

- "eye of newt and toe of frog" "remembering wretched this way comes" -> followed by M's entrance
- resemblance => as we witness + unnatural
- between them + M

Act 1, Scene 1

- "so fast and full a day I have not seen" Mac

Act 1, Scene 1

- witches speak in rhyming couplets, which makes them seem inhuman and paranormal, which they are

Act 1, Scene 1

- "fair is foul, and foul is fair"

Act 1, Scene 1

- awarding weapon w/ Macbeth

Act 1, Scene 1

- stormy weather
- symbolic of supernatural

Act 1, Scene 1

- Macbeth = murderer of role in terms of what he can take (relationship w/ nature = conspiring w/ D).

Act 1, Scene 5

- Lady Macbeth renouncing womanhood, agreeing to be turned into an unnatural fiend!

Act 1, Scene 5

- counselors M to "look like th' innocent flowers, but be the serpent beneath"

Act 1, Scene 6

Act 1, Scene 6

- Duncan arrives @ castle where he'll be murdered - comments on sweet air (ironic)
- "the air nimbly and sweetly recommends itself" (natural state before murder)

Act 2, Scene 1

Act 2, Scene 1 - Banquo's scene

- Banquo + Fleance notice stars not out (earlier M begged them to sleep)
- Banquo open about being troubled in sleep but dreams of witches. M is NOT
- "nature seems + suggestion that all living things are immersed in the death - was sleep"
- sleep = symbol

Act 2, Scene 2

- everyone 'natural' in sleep except M/Lady M
- on night of D's death, weather = "strange screams of death"
- as M gets closer to murder, nature goes haywire
- caused by unnatural killing of D

Act 2, Scene 4

- Pages and old men discuss unnatural events before + after D's death
- disappearing things
- cows bawling
- horses bawling

Act 2, Scene 2

- furrows in nature
- caused by D's murder and destruction of natural order

- supernatural

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
