
## Nomenclature of Acid anhydrides

Named by dropping the word acid from the corresponding



Acetic anhydride


Mixed anhydrides

Named by giving in alphabetical order, the first part of the names of the two acids followed by "anhydride".

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
## Nomenclature of esters

IUPAC names for esters are derived by first citing the group derived from the alcohol, followed by the group derived from the carboxylic acid (with the ending –ate or –oate). They are named as worky? carboxylates - Alkyl from the alcohol, Carboxylate from the carboxylic acid precursor.
