It is used as a figure of speech to create a paradox or to achieve a special effect.

Simile

Metaphor

The word euphemism comes from the Greek word Euphemia, meaning "good speech", which is derived from the Greek adjective Euphemos, meaning "good" or "honorable". Euphemism is also used for the sake of courtesy or to avoid giving offense.
