1.1	" <i>Brave Macbeth</i> " - Captain	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Positive descriptions of Macbeth, become rare as the play develops He's desperate for his audience and the King to appreciate Macbeth's courage and his 'patriotic' actions 	
1.1	" <i>He unseamed him from the nave to th'chaps</i> " - Captain	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Description of Macbeth in an inhumane and supernatural tone Although the Captain admired this, Macbeth is brutally killing someone <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Foreshadows the rest of the murders throughout the play However, the prime time Macbeth murders through his own actions, not cowardly and guilt of innocence is upon him 	
1.2	" <i>Like valour's minion</i> " - Captain	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Uses a simile to portray Macbeth's character as audacious and fearless He is suggesting that Macbeth is the servant of bravery 	
1.2	" <i>What he hath lost, noble Macbeth hath won</i> " - Duncan	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Referring to the title of Thane of Cawdor Juxtaposition - between the two thanes: one is dishonourable and a traitor, the other is honourable and loyal Close quote to what the Witches said in Act 1.1 'when the battle's lost and won' Macbeth's inheritance of this title is something of a poisoned chalice if victory and defeat are so closely related and it is as easy to win as it is to lose Foreshadowing the downfall of Macbeth 	
1.3	" <i>All hail Macbeth, that shalt be king hereafter.</i> " - The Witches	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> The Witches' prophecies for Macbeth <ul style="list-style-type: none"> He will become Thane of Cawdor, then King 	
1.3	" <i>Thou shalt get kings, though thou be none</i> " - The Witches	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> The Witches' prophecies for Banquo <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Despite not being as powerful as Macbeth, he is a better man and his children shall be kings
