#### 2.3 VARKALA BEACH



These cliffs are of tertiary sedimentary formation and named by geologists as Varkala Formation. They are a geological monument as recorded by the Geological Survey of India. Counted as one of the top 10 seasonal beaches in the world by Discovery Channel, this beach has a stunning beauty of landscapes, brown sand and sea. It's a perfect spot to relax with the laid-back atmosphere. Popular for beach activities like swimming and sunbathing, this beach offers a striking sunset view. It can simply take your breath away with its long winding stretch of cliff that expands over the Arabian seal Varkala beach is also called Papanasam beach as it is believed that taking with washes away all sins. Varkala's climate is tropical and humid. The word 'papanasam' means wash away sins. Thousands of Hindu believers offer vavubali at the beach in the Malayalam month of Karkidakam, a rural belief to help the souls of ancestors to rest in peace. Varkala is a holy temple town. Its ancient Janardhana temple is dedicated to Lord Vishnu, who preserves and sustains life. The temple is said to have been founded some 2000 years ago, although its current structure dates back to the 13th century when it was rebuilt by a Pandya king. Papanasam Beach, at the end of the road past the temple, is considered sacred to Hindus. Its name means "destroyer of sins" and pilgrims perform rituals

for deceased relatives there. According to mythology, Varkala gets its name from Sage Narada's Valkalm - a garment that he threw to mark the spot where a group of followers had to pay penance for their misdeeds.

Best time to enjoy the beach at its best is between the months of late December and March. The weather is dry and sunny with the temperature hovering around 30 deg C. Avoid travelling during the months of April and May when the climate is hot and humid. The golden sand of Varkala Beach is ideal for a typical beach holiday and has a wide variety of exciting activities for every type of travellers. 


Figure 3.7 Buy things from vendors




Figure 3.10 Status of accessibility to transportation




Figure 3.14 Did you see any beach worker's or police officers?
