There can be multiple phrases in one sentence:

For example:

"All the students have passed beyond expectations."

**All the students** – Noun Phrase

**Have passed** – Verb Phrase

**Beyond expectations** – Prepositional Phrase

## **Compound Sentences**

A sentence that has at least two independent clauses joined by comma, semicolon, colon or conjunction.

#### Example:

This house is too expensive and that house is too small.

The law has been passed: from 31<sup>st</sup> Dec, all the citizens will have to comply with traffic norms.

She will decide whom she will marry; you better not interfere.

Compound sentences = Two Clauses + related teas.

I really need to go to work, but I am too sick to drive.

The robber tried to escape **but** the cops caught him.

He did not cheat on the test, **for** it is the wrong thing to do.

He ran out of money, **so** he had to stop playing poker.

I am counting my calories, yet I really want dessert.

Should we start the class now, or wait for the monitor to come?

She did not want to visit the dentist, yet she went anyway.

They got there early, and they got really good seats.

# **Compound-Complex Sentences**

These have more than one main clause and at least one subordinate clause. To put simple, it is a combination of a compound and complex sentence.

- My best friend came to my home **and** we decided to go shopping **because** we both had time.
- I don't like new channels **because** they are mostly fake, **so** I don't watch them.
