

13. How do you know if a copyright is valid in Thailand?
- If the work is original and the copyright time is still active, it is valid.
  - Check the publication date.
14. What does “work for hire” mean?
- It means the work was made as part of a job, and the employer owns the copyright.
15. How do we know if an idea already is copyrighted?
- Ideas are not copyrighted, but you can check if a specific written or recorded work is copyrighted.
16. How do you get “world copyright protection”?
- A work is protected in all Berne member countries if it is copyright protected in your own (provided your nation is a signatory to the Berne Convention). Protection can be obtained without doing any further actions, such as registering or using the worldwide copyright sign.

17. In some countries fixation is a requirement for copyright, what does it mean?
- It means the work must be saved in a physical form, like written or recorded.

18. Does a work need to be new to get copyright?
- No, it just needs to be original and not copied.
19. Is there a priority, similar to patent priority, for copyright?
- No, copyright starts when the work is created.
20. What is required for a database to get copyright protection in Thailand?
- The author must either be a citizen of Thailand, live in Thailand, or be a citizen of a nation that has joined the Convention on the Protection of Copyright. Additionally, it is expected that the primary focus of the work will be the residence in Thailand or any other accessible country.
21. Why is it important to distinguish ideas and expressions under copyright?
- Copyright only protects the way ideas are written or shown, not the ideas themselves.
22. What is the difference between intellectual assets and intellectual properties?
- Intellectual assets are ideas or creations. Intellectual properties are the legal rights to protect them.
23. Describe the 4 IP strategy arenas.
- Administrative - Managing and registering IP.
  - Judicial - Resolving IP disputes in court.
  - Business - Using IP to earn money.
  - Political - Influencing laws and policies to protect IP.
24. Does open-source mean that the software doesn't have copyright?
- No, open-source software still has copyright, but the owner lets others use and change it under certain rules.
