Ann Oakley's Gender Theory

Gender is typically learned through a number of processes:

Expectations - Parents expect different behaviour from boys and girls.

Imitation - Children will copy their parents. The parent is the role model.

Identification - Children copy examples seen on television

Group Pressure - Boys and girls tend to play with people of their own gender. If a boy plays with female toy he is like to be teased - it tends to be more acceptable for a girl to like typically male things than it is for a boy to like typically female things.
