

Q1. What are the three stories shared by Steve Jobs in the video? What was the inner philosophy that Jobs wanted to convey? Contextualized Narrative:

Steve Jobs, the founder of Apple, shared three important stories from his life during his Stanford University speech.

1. Looking Back to Understand

"You can't connect the dots looking forward; you can only connect them looking backward."

3. Living Your Own Life

"Your time is limited, so don't waste it living someone else's life."

Jobs reflected on his cancer diagnosis, which reminded him that life is short.

Knowing that time is limited made him focus only on what truly mattered.

Inner Philosophy:

Life is too short to live according to others' expectations. We must have the courage to follow our own hearts and intuition. As a student, this reminds me to focus on my true interests now and not be afraid to take risks for what I believe in.
