

“Homosexuals must be allowed to serve openly in the military”

Homosexuals are people sexually attracted to members of one's own sex. As of today, being openly gay won't get you turned away from the military. The Department of Defense has issued high-level guidance instructing military recruiters to accept openly gay applicants. That's the headline, and it's a big one, but there are big caveats, too. One is that the guidance given to recruiters is based on the status of legal process, and that gay recruits are being told that if the ban on gays in the military is upheld, their status might be revoked in the future.
