Introduction: Emily Dickinson is widely thought of as one of the most genius and talented American Poets of all time. - I. Emily's Writing
- A. Wrote 1,775 poems but only 7 were published (anonymously) before her death.
- B. Considered unconventional due to her sometimes unclear rhyme scheme, irregular capitalization and use of dashes.
- 1. Irregularity of grammar and punctuation could be a possible representation of the irregular emoti ons that she experienced. Many people think that he was somewhat "off."
- C. 1,768 poems were found in her dresser drawer by her sister, Lavinia, following her death.
- 1. There were instructions to have the poems destroyed
- 2. These orders were obviously ignored and close family and friends trang together her poems to be published.
- 3. The Poems of Emily Dickinson wasn't published by 1, 1955.
 - a. This was years after her death, which occurred in 1886
- D. Wentworth Angil son was sent with v for original poems during her life.
- 1. He noticed how talented she was in writing.
- 2. He did believe that she was a bit too unconventional with her use of punctuation, rhyme, irregularit ies in her rhythm and unnecessary capitalization.
 - a. When sending feedback he chose to overlook this because he was pleased with her talent.
 - b. These poems were sent in 1862.
 - c. Higginson was one of the very few people that Emily shared her poetry with during her lifetim e.
